Projects are taught by older 4-H youth and adult volunteers.

1ST GENERATION 4-H

What does 1st Generation 4-H mean?

1st Generation 4-H youth and families are youth and families not previously engaged in 4-H youth development programming. Efforts to engage 1st Generation 4-H youth and families have a purposeful goal that the program reflects the community in which it operates. In many cases, it will require specific, intentional work to engage communities/populations historically not included.

Where did the definition come from?

Program Directors in the North Central Region (IA, WI, MO, IL, IN, OH, MI, NE, KS, ND, SD, MN) and National 4-H council have invested time and effort to convene representatives from the North Central Region to talk about the challenge of engaging 1st Generation 4-Hers and the definition was developed

collaboratively at a strategic planning meeting in Milwaukee in April of 2015.

Why focus on 1st Generation?

By learning to embrace the context of diversity and building programs that are welcoming and inclusive ALL YOUTH (regardless of geography, gender, race, culture, language disability, national origin, sexual orientation or family income), we add value to all our programs and participants. We need to do this because

- 4-H will become obsolete without it
- It is a critical investment in our future as a state
- It is research-based
- No one else has the capacity or scale to make a difference in this area
- It is the law
- It is the right thing to do!

CEDAR CREST ICE-CREAM CONTEST

Cedar Crest Ice Cream and the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation have teamed up once again to present a "Create and Name the 2016 4-H Ice Cream Featured Flavor" contest for Wisconsin 4-H clubs and groups. The winning group will receive a Cedar Crest Ice Cream Party and a \$300 cash prize. In addition, the winning flavor will be produced during June Dairy Month 2016. Contest entries are **DUE** December 1.

"This contest is a wonderful opportunity for 4-H'ers across the state to work together and implement all facets learned through 4-H, like teamwork, creative thinking and effective communication," says Jim Reid, president of the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation. "We appreciate the continued partnership with Cedar Crest and their commitment to 4-H youth of all ages."

This is the fourth year of the partnership. The winning flavor in last year's contest was Big Muddy, developed by the Friendly Valley 4-H Club. Dykesville Dolphins 4-H Club crafted the centennial flavor Udder Delight. The inaugural winning flavor was CranRaspberry Cheesecake, created by the Sunnyside Climbers 4-H Club.

Entries in this year's contest will be evaluated by a panel of judges chosen by Cedar Crest's staff. The winning flavor will be available for sale summer 2016. Cedar Crest currently manufactures over 80 flavors of ice cream at its

Manitowoc facility, and distributes product in five states. Many of the flavors now produced by Cedar Crest Ice Cream were created through prior competitions like the contest now open to Wisconsin 4-H clubs and groups.


ART LAB

Everyone is welcome to come to LEGO® Project meetings. We usually meet the 4th Thursday of the month (**Nov and Dec: 3rd Thurs**) at the Government Center at 4:45pm-5:45pm

In the October LEGO® Project meeting, members presented their homework project, did a build limited to 50 pieces, and did a back to back build. For the back to back build, each person picked 2 identical sets of bricks and connected one set without their partner being able to see. Then the partner was given the unconnected set. The builder gave verbal directions for how to connect the bricks but couldn't see what the partner was doing and the partner couldn't ask questions. The goal is to give and receive directions well enough so that the partner ends up with the same structure as the builder. It's hard!





The homework assignment was to build something representing what you want to do as an adult. Luke wants to be an astronaut and brought a shuttle.

Dominic made a ship with a flag for his 50 piece build.




WINTER CAMP

The next Winter Camp will be held January 15-17, 2016 at Camp CrossWoods in Bayfield County. Campers must be at least 14 years old OR in the 8th - 13th grade.

The Leaders' Association pays 80% of the camp fee for members who completed the Trip Award Process and were awarded the trip. Other members may attend at a cost of \$85 per camper. The fee covers meals, lodging, and use of the recreational facilities.

The purpose of Winter Camp is to provide leadership, citizenship, and life skill experiences to young adults, with lots of time to enjoy winter outdoor fun. The camp has a limited number of snowshoes available. If you wish to ski and have access to equipment, feel free to bring it. Indoor activities include ping pong, air hockey, carpet ball, and music.


