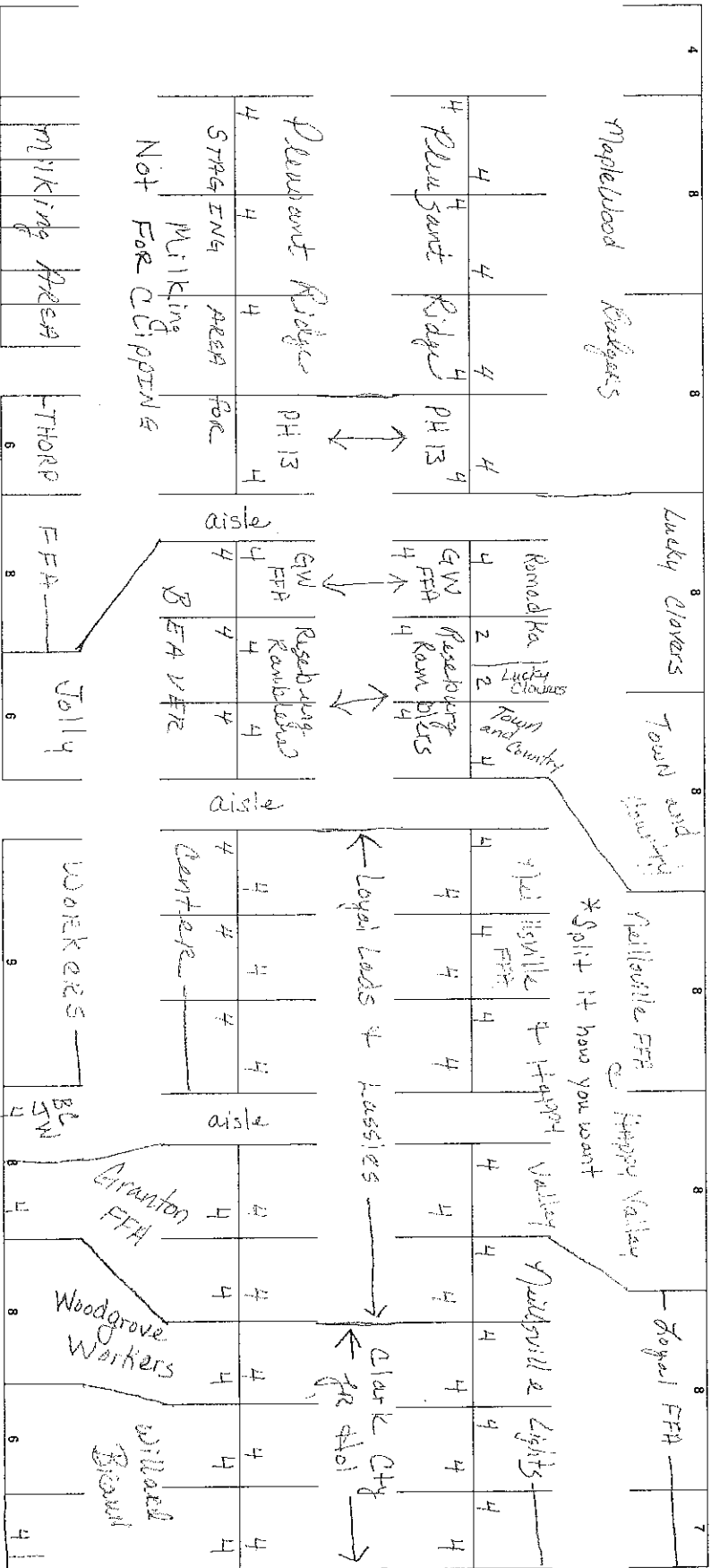
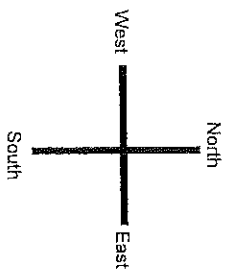

Clark County Fair Dairy Stalling Procedure

The stalling committee assigns space based on the stalling sheet submitted making adjustments for breed size. In general, a Holstein calf is allotted 1 space, a Holstein yearling is allotted 1.5 spaces, and a Holstein Cow is allotted 2 spaces. Other breeds are adjusted based on age and size.

Stalling is always a challenge. Each club and FFA is a puzzle piece to be fitted in the stalling puzzle. Animal drops and/or alternate animal switches occurring after entry deadline can significantly affect space allotted.

Here is the stalling committee's process in determining barn stalling:

1. Large animal exhibits (based on stalling form) are plotted first. Every attempt is made to stall them in a traditional location in the barn or near an end so they are closer to storage areas for the large number of exhibitors' feed.
2. Smaller exhibits are placed to fill in the remaining stall areas.
3. Every attempt is made to not stall exhibits across from the milking area.
4. Tack/storage. The fair board provides a feed storage tent at the East end of the dairy barn.
 - Exhibitors on the East end are asked to store their feed in the tent.
 - Exhibitors on the West end have some room on the end to store feed/tack.
 - Those along the wall with door exits often store items outside under the eaves.
 - Every attempt is made to give exhibitors in the central locations additional space for storing some feed (not the entire week's supply). This is dependent on the amount of room remaining after accounting for animal numbers. For safety, bales are not to be stacked higher than 4 rows.
 - Tack and show boxes can be in the aisle behind your animals. Extra stalling space is not allotted.
5. The committee tracks clubs/FFA's who historically enter more animals than they bring to the fair. When space is limited, these groups are assigned smaller areas based on their history.

The stalling committee along with the county dairy committee wants the best possible fair experience for all exhibitors. This can only happen if everyone works together. If you have extra room and your neighbor needs room, please share. We are all volunteers hoping to offer a wonderful experience to youth. Let's be sure to demonstrate cooperativeness, patience, respect, kindness, and understanding.

If you know your club/chapter is going to have significant changes, please alert the extension office immediately. The stalling committee can attempt to make stalling adjustments. That way, a "tight" exhibit can get the additional room they need.

MILKING AREA CLEAN UP SCHEDULE

We want to maintain a clean, sanitary experience for fair attendees. Therefore, clubs/FFAs with milking animals are expected to keep the milking area clean during the fair.

Milking area cleanup expectations:

- 1) Clean up Manure and Urine and put in wheelbarrow.
- 2) Spread a thin layer of lime on the floor to prevent slipping.
- 3) Use shavings to help dry up wet areas, help it look clean and smell better.
